### What are study levels?

The study levels have been developed to ensure that you benefit from information that is appropriate to your knowledge and experience. As a guide:

- Level A resources are designed for people with little or no experience of working with children with severe, complex, or profound learning difficulties.
- Level D resources have been developed for experienced professionals in SEN.

If you find that some of the levels we have recommended don't quite match your needs, you can change your study level at any time.

The modules are listed in a recommended sequential order, but you can start wherever you like. We advise you to save or print a copy of your study plan so that you can refer back to it at any time.

If you feel that the resources are too detailed for your needs, or you require further information, you can change your level of study at any time.
